Editorial

THOSE OF YOU who are interested in the fate of the GAZETTE will be glad to know that it is to continue until Volume I is finished—that is, up to the November number this year. What is to happen after that will be announced then, and will depend to a certain extent on financial circumstances, but chiefly on an Editor being forthcoming before the beginning of October, when the decision must be made. In the meantime, temporary readjustments have been made whereby it is possible for the present Editor to reluctantly agree to attempt to see Volume I through. You will all feel that it is most fitting to have at least a complete volume as an historical relic of the Army Nursing Services' venture stored in the War Office Library and the Imperial War Museum. Probably it is news to some of you that your GAZETTE enters such august portals.

You will all be sorry to hear that Miss M. B. Clelland has given up the Honorary Secretaryship. For the present there will be two secretaries, the Friends' Secretary, who will deal with all matters of personal help and advice for members, and the Membership and General Secretary who, in conjunction with Branch Secretaries, will deal with subscriptions register for membership and GAZETTE, and will also be responsible for general office correspondence, etc.

The special committee considering the designs for the GAZETTE cover meet too late in April for their decisions to be given in this number. Material has to be in the printers' hands several weeks before publication. The information will be given in August. Some designs will probably be exhibited at the Jubilee Year Reunion on 7th June, which it is hoped will be a record function, the grand finale of the Q.A.R.A.N.C. Corps Week.

## Annual General Meeting

THE FOURTH Annual General Meeting of the Q.A.R.A.N.C. Association was held on Saturday, 29th March, 1952, at 20 John Islip Street, London.

#### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Membership.—Mrs. A. Humpage was appointed Membership Secretary in May, 1951. Total number of names on register is 2,747. This has been reduced by 12 deaths, 5 resignations and 1,843 lapsed subscriptions since the formation of Association. Present paid-up membership is: Life, 398; Annual, 887. There have been 8 new Life Members and 104 Annual since 1st January this year.

There are five branches with 39 Life and 217 Annual Members—104 lapsed subscriptions.

Social Activities.—The report on the fourth Reunion was given in No. 7 GAZETTE. The fifth is being held this year as part of the Corps Week on 7th June. A suggestion had been made that a Reunion should sometimes be held elsewhere than in London, organized by one of the branches, but this idea could not be followed up. The branches arrange local social events to suit their own members.

Representation.—On the occasion of the death of our late beloved and honoured King, the Association testified to its respect, deep loyalty and sorrow by joining in the expressions of a nation's mourning. The February GAZETTE records this for all our members. (As this was our first representative gathering since that sad event, we all stood a moment in silent, grateful memory.)

The Association plot on the Field of Remembrance at Westminster Abbey in November gave members and others the opportunity of paying their tribute to the Army Nursing Services. Representatives attended the opening service and laid their crosses on your behalf.

*Presentations.*—A silver cup, to be known as the Q.A.R.A.N.C. Association Cup, is being prepared as a sports trophy to be presented annually from all members of the Association to the serving officer or other rank judged as the best all-round sportswoman of the year. Conditions of the award are not yet worked out, but it is hoped that the annual presentations can take place at members' reunions. It is good to know this is in hand, for it does look as if it might be our last presentation for some time, since our Reserve Fund may be called upon for rescue work with our other funds.

Gazette.—Nine issues have now been published. There are 697 subscribers, an insufficient number to meet the mounting costs of publication. More advertisements are to be sought. A decision will be made in October as to the financial possibility of starting Volume 2 (due February, 1953), restricting publication to the number of subscribers on our lists. Vigorous efforts are being made to clear costs of Volume 1. Members can greatly help by purchasing present stocks to send out as gifts or propaganda. In view of the financial position, the present Editor is willing to complete Volume 1, or to assist anyone else taking the work on, but will not in any circumstances continue after that. Mrs. B. Cobden has consented to become Assistant Editor.

Benevolence.—Mrs. E. H. Mills, a member of the Central Committee, was appointed Friends' Secretary to carry out the Friends' Scheme outlined last year. This scheme has been a great success, though there is still room for expansion and further improvements.

The three benevolent funds have between them 19 annuitants, to whom roughly £623 go. There are on the books 71 others who receive financial help occasionally, or to whom a Christmas gift is sent. These, together with donations to one or two outside funds, which probably help nurses eligible to be Association members, and small gifts to sick members amount roughly to £626—*i.e.*, total benevolent work cost about £1,250 for 1951.

Other assistance is given to members in the way of putting them in touch with suitable work or helping them with inquiries for homes, etc., or for holidays or convalescence.

Army Sisters' Memorial Fund.—This Fund is not controlled by the Association. No grants have been made this last year, because it was not known what expenses the publication of the Memorial Book might involve. An offer has now been accepted from Messrs. Cassells to publish this book. We should therefore shortly be in a position to advertise further grants in the nursing Press. A second article on the Memorial Fund will appear in the GAZETTE shortly, bringing members up to date with the latest information. The first article appeared in the first issue of the GAZETTE.

Queen Mary's House Fund.—This Fund is not controlled by the Association, but the Association Chairman has been the Hon. Secretary of Q.M.H. Fund and the work has been carried out from the Association office. Other arrangements have now been made for this Fund, which no longer directly concerns the Association. This is a financial loss to the Association, as Q.M.H. Fund shared expenses with all other funds administered.

Management.—The Central Committee has met four times, and the Finance and Grants Committee six times during the last twelve months. It has been a busy year, and many thanks are due to all who have helped in any way. Members are reminded that all work done is on a voluntary basis, except for one paid clerical assistant.

Mrs. Humpage, to whom many thanks are due, has organized a great drive to increase membership. This means following up eligibles whose names are seen in the nursing and other Press, contacting all who join the Reserve of Officers or the Territorial Army, and others heard of through many sources. As Membership Secretary, she is very grateful to all members who have responded to her appeal by paying subscriptions several years in advance, and for all the help given by A.D.A.N.S. and matrons overseas who sent in nominal rolls with subscriptions. These lists have helped considerably in getting records up to date. Branch Secretaries, too, have been most cooperative.

Mrs. Humpage also maintains the GAZETTE subscribers register.

Mrs. L. M. M. Laws, Hon. Treasurer, has been obliged to resign owing to domestic affairs. Fortunately the services of Miss E. A. Baldock, who has been on both Central and Finance Committees for two years, have been secured. Members would wish their thanks conveyed to Mrs. Laws for her work and interest and will heartily welcome Miss Baldock.

To Mrs. E. H. Mills a debt of gratitude is owed for her capable organization of the Friends' Scheme. The work of the Friends' Secretary entails not only making and keeping contact with the members helped, but all the correspondence necessary to find visitors, as well as the many outside sources which have to be approached on various questions.

It is obviously desirable that both Membership and Friends' Secretaries should be *ex-officio* members of the Central Committee, to which principle members present are asked to give approval.

With regard to the Association funds—*i.e.*, those other than the Army Sisters' Memorial Fund and Queen Mary's House Fund, which I have told you about, action has been taken as proposed last year for use of some of the capital of the Q.A.I.M.N.S. Benevolent Fund. The matter is now in the hands of the solicitors and counsel, and the outcome cannot be predicted. Also, a formal Trust Deed has been drawn up and completed for the Association Benevolent Fund, and the  $\pounds_{2,000}$  previously in dispute as to ownership has been scheduled in the deed of this Fund. For this Fund, too, a grant of  $\pounds_{300}$  from the Army Benevolent Fund has been received.

The T.A.N.S. Fund does not require any comment beyond that the sale of the second cottage brought in  $\pounds_{3,500}$ .

The Central Fund, with its Reserve, must be built up as much as possible, for beside the fact that it would have to assist the GAZETTE Fund if needed, we are faced with the fact that it may become necessary in the future to use rented accommodation for the office in place of the two rooms we have here. This is a very serious matter indeed, which we are in no position to meet at an early date. Members might please bear this in mind in case they can suggest possible alternative accommodation. It comes to this, strictest economy is needed on our part in running the Association, and on your part, recruitment of more members for the Association and subscribers for the GAZETTE, together with prompt and unprompted payment of dues. Postage is expensive and dips deeply into annual half-crowns which are urgently needed for other purposes.

Members in first year : Miss I. C. C. Withers, Miss C. M. Courtenay, Mrs. B. Cobden.

Retiring Members : Miss D. Bridges, Miss E. A. Baldock, Miss J. Patterson, who were accorded a vote of thanks.

## Book Review

#### ANÆSTHESIA FOR NURSES. By W. S. Finnie, M.B., Ch.B., B.Sc., D.A. A Nursing Mirror Publication. 75. 6d.

Pre-medication and Post-operative Care.—Good chapter : stress is laid on the duty of nursing staff to a patient. Easily understood and clearly explained.

General Anæsthesia.—I think this chapter tends to go into the subject patchily and in too great a detail. The mode of action of relaxation and acetylcholine not clearly defined. Unless very carefully read one has the impression that anæsthesia is achieved by depriving the patient of oxygen in his inspired air. This chapter would have been improved with a summary of the stages of anæsthesia and an indication of the types of anæsthesia used for common practice.

Local Anæsthesia.—A good chapter, but no remarks made indicating the need to keep the patient mentally undisturbed and minimizing outside disturbances such as talking and rough handling.

Spinal Anæsthesia.—Some mention should have been made of the anatomy of the vertebral column. This would have made the technique easier and more clearly understood. Again, no mention is made of "indications or contraindications" for spinal anæsthesia and of the need to keep the patient mentally undisturbed.

Types of Anæsthetic Machines.—On the whole a fairly good chapter, but there are not enough diagrams, which would have saved text and made the subject much clearer. Only an outline of the machines has been given, which would probably be of little use without practical experience.

Accessory Equipment.—Fair chapter, easy to understand. Emphasis placed on sterilization.

To sum up, I would have liked a chapter on Theatre Emergencies, and some indication could have been given of the type of anæsthetic used for different operations, with a brief reason for its uses.

## News from the Branches

Australia sent a very interesting annual report. The members in the two States, New South Wales and Victoria, have decided that in order to keep the interest stimulated in both, each will take its turn alternate years to act as Association headquarters for the Branch, with their officials elected for the ensuing year from that State. The Chairman, Miss D. A. Swinton, paid a very high tribute to the Hon. Secretary, Miss Avery, who although she has had a tremendous task with her own new appointment as Secretary-General of the Australian Nursing Federation, has never failed to give of her very best to the Association.

The Branch sent a letter of deep sympathy to the Association patron, Queen Mary, on the death of our loved King. They also sent a wreath bearing the Q.A. colours on the death of the late Field-Marshal Sir Thomas Blamey, who was Commander-in-Chief of the Australian Military Forces.

The report tells us that Major Heather Kirkwood, Q.A.R.A.N.C., a trainee of the Royal Melbourne Hospital who, you will remember, was entertained by the Branch some years ago, had sent them a gift a gramophone record of the Q.A.R.A.N.C. march, "Grey and Scarlet." This, unfortunately, was broken in transit, but they have ordered another.

One phrase in the report should be quoted : "It can be said with sincerity and pride that, whilst there remains an ex-member of the Q.As. in Australia, the Corps in which we served will never be forgotten."

# "Hopping" with the B.R.C.S.

LAST AUTUMN I spent a most interesting week at a British Red Cross Society camp in the heart of the Kentish hop country. The Counties of London and Kent branches of the B.R.C.S. have for many years sent mobile dispensaries to this part of the country for the hoppicking season, when thousands of Londoners from the East End spend their annual holiday picking the hops needed in the brewing of beer.

The County of London Branch had two camps. The one to which I was sent was set up in the village hall at Hunton, a little village between Tunbridge Wells and Maidstone. The hall was divided into a dormitory and a dining-room by means of a blanket curtain but, being the only S.R.N., I had my bed in the gallery, which I shared with the County Director—a great honour. The staff usually consisted of about eight to twelve members at a time, mostly doing one week's duty. In the majority of cases this week was part of their annual holiday, which they willingly gave over year after year to this cause.

I was on duty every day from 10 a.m. to 12.30 p.m. and from 5.30 p.m. to 7.30 p.m. in the only permanent dispensary in the centre of the biggest hoppers' camp. This was a tin-roofed, stone-floored hut consisting of two rooms, a waiting room and a treatment room. The treatment room was equipped with two trolleys carrying an assortment of basins, forceps, dressings and thermometers; a table, on which stood two primus stoves to boil a kettle of water, and a fish-kettle sterilizer for the instruments and basins; and two cupboards fairly adequately filled with dressings and medicines most often in use. The local doctor, or his assistant for the hop season, paid a visit to this dispensary every morning to deal with any cases beyond my scope, fill in countless N.H.S. forms, and order any future treatment.

In addition to this permanent dispensary, three vans were rigged up as mobile dispensaries. Each carried large trays filled with medicines, dressings and bandages sufficient to cope with the minor accidents and ailments usually met with on the twice-daily rounds of the hopfields and hoppers' huts. The arrival of the vans was always greeted by a crowd of hoppers and their children suffering from the usual household mishaps which could not easily be treated in the limited accommodation of the huts. Any case beyond the scope of the members was either brought to me at the permanent dispensary, or I was taken to see the case when the rounds were finished and my hut closed.

The types of cases treated were mostly routine ones : innumerable cuts, grazes and small burns, as well as coughs and turmy upsets as the result of the abnormal amount of fruit eaten. As wasps were everywhere, we were constantly treating stings, to relieve which the hoppers themselves applied mud-their panacea for all minor wounds! There were no maternity cases during my week's tour of duty, though a baby had been born the night before I arrived. Usually, in such cases nowadays, the mother is taken to hospital in time and does not have to be delivered in the huts where sanitary arrangements are crude in the extreme. The occupational diseases were hoppers' gout, hoppers' rash and hoppers' eye, for each of which a routine treatment was given and the case noted for future reference. There was, however, the occasional bit of excitement. In one case a woman, who was stung on the tongue by a wasp, was brought to me and had to be rushed off immediately to the doctor for an injection of adrenalin to reduce the most alarming swelling. In another case I was called from the dispensary to a hut where a small boy had pulled over a kettle of boiling water and scalded his leg badly. I gave the immediate treatment and called the doctor for advice on the necessity for hospitalization.

The conditions in the huts, though very primitive, are greatly improved to what they were. Some camps had electric light installed, but they were exceptional, candles and oil lamps being more usual. Each camp had outdoor latrines. There were communal canteens, but most of the families still preferred to cook their own meals over wood fires in the open. The huts were not furnished. Some families had brought their own beds and bedding, chairs, tables, etc., and managed to make their huts very comfortable, but many were sleeping on straw with the minimum of home comforts. The farmers laid on amenities in the form of cinema shows and the like, which were held in a large marquee and were well patronized.

The B.R.C.S. dispensaries filled a much felt want and were greatly appreciated by all—hoppers, doctors and farmers alike. The local inhabitants kept us well supplied with presents of fresh fruit and vegetables, but the most practical expression of their gratitude was the offer of the use of their baths at the end of the day's work. The experience gained by the members was invaluable, as it gave them an opportunity to put into practice some of the theoretical knowledge they already had.

## Military Nurse Training

THIRTY-EIGHT Military Hospitals, twenty-three overseas and fifteen in this country, were granted approval by the General Nursing Council in February, 1952, as training schools so that R.A.M.C. and Q.A.R.A.N.C. other ranks may enter for the Preliminary State Examination on completion of one year's training instead of being required to take both the Preliminary and the Final State Examinations together after obtaining the Army Nursing Certificate. The previous approval of two military hospitals as individual training schools was not satisfactory, since only a very limited number of trainees could be posted to such training establishments.

Training takes place under qualified nurse tutors, trained nursing staff, and medical officers.
